

“READING’S “general election” ended at 12.30 this morning when the final result was announced --- and, despite earlier Tory optimism, Labour have retained control of the Town Council with a majority increased by two. They now have 33 out of a total of 52 seats, which gives them a majority of 14.

A film stuntman, a member of the Sealed Knot and a fight arranger for the Napoleonic Association, Mr Harvey was the guest of Drama 80, a Saturday afternoon workshop based at Rustington Scout Hall.

It is run for young people between the ages of five and 22 by Littlehampton drama teacher Michael Edgley, who is producer for Jubilee Productions.

Mr Harvey brought with him an assistant to help demonstrate how fights are staged for theatre, films and TV but he also used some of the students in his performance.

Arms collection

He had plenty of props for not only does he run a theatrical costumiers in Brighton but he also has the biggest collection of arms and weapons for hire for theatrical use along the south coast.

Ralph, who has recently been working on the new film version of Ivanhoe, brought with him a range of swords from a hand-and-a-half broadsword to fencing foils.

One student, 19-year-old Sean Nash, took part in the action when he was stabbed with a dagger and then thrown over Ralph's shoulder.

Another student, John Barley, 21, was dressed in Viking armour and used for a demonstration of various types of attack with a sword.

Finally he put a Viking helmet on one of the younger students, nine-year-old Stephen Thompson, and whacked him over the head with a sword --- just to prove it could be done without hurting.

Ready for the fray ...

Wayne de Strete's stunt team is anxious to recruit keen members from the Horsham area with a view to forming a group here.

The team is based in Brighton but is obviously keen to spread its wings. Outlining what they do Wayne said: "Everyone is trained with weaponry, including guns, but if we are going to practise or give displays of this type we have to inform the police.

"We do county shows, fetes, and take on almost anything, representing Cavaliers, Romans, knights, men-at-arms, Vikings and Western gunslingers, and we go to 'battles' --- where there are up to 800 people a day on each side."

Members of the group have appeared in Dr Who, Gentlemen and Players and Blue Peter on television as well as performing with comedian Bobby Davro.

There is to be a video release in September of the team's re-enactment of the Battle of Agincourt and they have taken part in James Bond and similar films.

"We have got chain mail and other costumes from the earliest days through to the Special Air Service," Wayne said. They normally draw a halt at World War Two, but not inevitably.

The group, whose members come from Broadbridge Heath, Burgess Hill, Colchester and further afield, tries to be as authentic as possible: Wayne, as the knight, carries a shield which is a standard singlehanded, tempered blade and he wears chain mail.

The medieval man-at-arms, Mark Griffin, of Burgess Hill, has sackings wrapped round his feet and Wayne's father, Ralph Harvey of Hove, who calls himself a "mean" Western gunslinger, wears shiny black leather from head to foot and sports two guns in his holsters as well as a Colt 45 revolver and a 54 calibre buffalo rifle.

Jeff Baker, cavalier, also of Hove, wears his unmistakable sweeping hat, velvet tunic and high boots. He has two sons, [private], eight, and [private], five, who are already very interested in their father's hobby and take part in some of the shows.

Eddie Bien, Roman, from Portslade, wears a fabric skirt encircled with a red band and with stripes of leather hanging down. The group is fortunate in having a leather worker as a member, who can help by working on the leather gear including shoes that they need.

Wayne said that the club had been running for three years and before that his father had hired people as he needed them for various shows which he undertook, so Wayne grew up in an atmosphere of historic costumes and stunts.

He explained that membership of the club was a hobby but if there was payment from any source hiring them, this was shared out by those taking part.

Wayne and his wife, [private], who also joins in by dressing up as a medieval or saxon maiden, have a one year old son, [private] and they hope that he will carry on the tradition. Many members' wives take part. They can fight to a limited extent and they also do dancing and modern day fighting.

“We are looking for members who are prepared to come down to Brighton for training and if their standard is good enough, we hope to form a group in Horsham,” he said.

“They must be really interested and be able to get on with other people as well as having an outstanding nature. Training can take a long time --- six weeks for the basic understanding and six months for the full training.

“The different weapons require different handling and everything is worked out, with safety as the major factor. The group is for enjoyment, not just to appear at shows etc. Sometimes there are outings to historic places and there is a social side to club activities.

“We have various supplies for our gear including Alan Meek of Guildford, who is a professional armourer. There is a publication called Call to Arms and this is very useful to keep us up to date.”
