

1. JOHN MacCOMBIE was born ca. 1825 in Resolis, Cromartyshire, Scotland


Father: Alexander McCombie

Mother: Jennet Aird

Resolis parish is located on the Black Isle in Cromartyshire near the eastern shore of Scotland.

Research note:

Both John McCombie's father, Alexander McCombie and uncle, Donald McCombie were born in Kiltearn, Ross and Cromarty, Scotland. Alexander McCombie then went to Newhall in Resolis and was a blacksmith there.



The place they lived at was at Newhall in Resolis parish.

~ midnight 6 June 1841

In 1841, John MCombie was living with his parents, Alexander and Jennet (Aird) MCombie, at Newhall in Resolis, Cromartyshire, Scotland.

His father, Alexander MCombie was a blacksmith.

Jennet Aird was the mother of John. Sometimes in the Scottish censuses, married woman were written down with their maiden last names.

John M'Combie joined the staff of 'John O'Groat Journal' in around March 1850. This was base on the information given in the 11 July 1851 newspaper article.

The newspaper was located in the northern part of Scotland at Wick, Caithness, Scotland.

In 1851, "John M. Combie", age 26, was a lodger in the household of William and Ann Georgeson at High Street in Wick, Caithness, Scotland.



~ 11 July 1851

John M'Combie was treated with a farewell dinner at Mrs. Duell's Coffee-House in Wick, Caithness, Scotland.

The staff of the 'John O'Groat Journal' praised his character while he was at that paper. From the newspaper, John o' Groat Journal, Friday 11 July 1851:

FAREWELL SUPPER. --- On the evening of the 3rd instant the printers and others connected with the 'John O'Groat Journal' Office entertained Mr John M'Combie at supper, in Mrs Doull's Coffee-House, Wick. Mr M'Combie has been engaged during the last sixteen months as sub-Editor and Reporter on the 'John O'Groat Journal,' and on the eve of his leaving for England, to undertake the sub-editorship of the 'Sunderland News,' a paper just started, his colleagues of the 'John O'Groat' press, before parting, took advantage of this mode of demonstrating their high respect for him. Mr Ritchie, foreman, occupied the chair; and in course of the evening, in his own name and that of those present, expressed to Mr M'Combie the happiness which it afforded him, on reviewing the period during which they had been associated, to find that nothing but friendly feeling and harmony had prevailed --- the desire to oblige and accommodate having been, on every occasion, mutual. This he ascribed as owing, in no small degree, to Mr M'Combie's kind and gentlemanly manners. He was glad to add, without exaggerating, that the effect of Mr M'Combie's affable and polite bearing was not confined to the staff of the 'John O'Groat Journal,' but was felt and valued by an extensive circle of other acquaintances, who regarded him with feelings of the highest esteem. He concluded by expressing the company's regret at parting with Mr M'Combie, and their warm wishes for his future success in life. Mr M'Combie replied by thanking Mr Ritchie and his other friends for their good opinion and good wishes, which he, in very feeling terms, reciprocated. --- Mr Guthrie, Free Church teacher, Pulteneytown, who was present as a personal friend of Mr M'Combie, in a very neat and appropriate speech, testified to the regret universally prevalent in circles enjoying the pleasure of Mr M'Combie's acquaintance. --- The evening was spent in the happiest manner --- Mrs Doull's arrangements for the conduct of the party being in every respect complete.

John M'Combie married **ANNIE DAWSON** on 20 December 1851 at Laygate English Presbyterian Church in South Shields, Durham, England.





She was a sister of John McCombie's wife. A few years later the McCombies named their daughter after her, Georgiana Harriet Wakefield McCombie.



Since its permanent enlargement to eight pages on the 12th April 1856, has met with the most signal success, and is daily adding to its list of Subscribers. At the date of the last Government Returns, printed by order of the House of Commons, the Chronicle stood, in point of circulation, at the head of the Provincial Press o[f] Ireland; and we feel proud in stating that the average number of readers each week for the last six months, taking them at the lowest estimate, has been about 7,500.

The additional space afforded by the enlargement enables us now to present a complete summary of the News of the week, both Foreign and Domestic, while a liberal infusion of Literary matter, both Original and Selected, makes the Journal an interesting Miscellany, and Family Newspaper. As a special feature, it may be mentioned that the Agricultural Department of the Journal ("The Farmer's Chronicle") is carefully compiled with the view of affording the latest and most reliable information, both as to practical improvements in that branch of National Industry, and as to Prices Currents, Prospects, Markets, Fairs, &c.

From the newspaper, Carlisle Journal, Friday 8 January 1858:

Miscellaneous.

An Editorial Holiday. --- The Coleraine Chronicle, edited by Mr. M'Combie, formerly of the Sunderland News, appeared last Saturday two pages short of its usual size, a circumstance which was explained in the following editorial announcement: --- "In order that Christmas-day might be enjoyed as a holiday by our workmen, we have curtailed the size of to-day's paper. We are sure our readers will not grudge us this liberty, when we state that Christmas is the only entire holiday throughout the year that printers can enjoy." --- We are not aware whether Mr. M'Combie was equally considerate at Sunderland, but the News has now a holiday en permanence.

Mr. John M'Combie, and Miss Marion M. M'Combie were on the steam ship Islay when the weather was not favorable.

From the newspaper, Coleraine Chronicle, Saturday 1 August 1868:

On Wednesday a smart breeze ruffled the waves, and on Thursday morning the wind blew a rather strong gale, and raised the surface of the water into magnificient billows. Many intending voyagers were deterred by the rather threatening aspect of affairs, but a goodly party put on a bold face, and in spite of wind and weather, trusted themselves to the good steam ship Islay, as she rocked by the pier of Portrush, straining her cables, as if eager and impatient to bound over the foaming billows. As the time for sailing drew near crowds flocked to the quay to see the departure of the steamer, with her company of hardy passengers who had the pluck to face the storm. A fine company they were, including a number of the fair sex, all bent on making the most of the occasion, and enjoying themselves to the utmost.

From this we can say that John MacCombie's wife Annie was a daughter of Henry and Annie Dawson and that she was of English ancestry.

Research note:

Alexander J. MacCombie was a nephew of John MacCombie of Coleraine, Ireland. He was a son of his sister, Catherine, who married their cousin, John McCombie, a Wine and Spirit Merchant in Edinburgh, Scotland.

John MacCombie of Coleraine, seeing that he only had daughters, probably had hoped that perhaps his nephew, Alexander, may be able to run the Coleraine Chronicle after he steps down or died.

But Alexander's early death ended that plan.



Mr. John MacCombie was appointed by the Lord Chancellor to the commission of the peace for the county of Antrim, Ireland and will sit at Portrush petty sessions. From this point on, he had the "J.P." (Justice of the peace) added to his name.

REPLY.

My Dear Friends --- I feel utterly unequal to the task of properly thanking you for your magnificent testimonial, or for the graceful address with which it is associated. After fifty years' constant work in journalism, forty-five of which I spent at the helm of the "Coleraine Chronicle," I cannot complain that Providence has decreed my retirement, owing to my advanced age and increasing dimness of vision. Few, indeed, are spared to such lengthened service, and fewer still are they who, in closing their life-work, receive such substantial evidence of the goodwill of those among whom so many years have been spent.

Your estimate represents my work as it should have been, and you attribute to me characteristics which I have striven to foster and develop; but I fear that in both I have fallen far short of the ideal.

In political conflicts and social changes it has ever been a gratification to me that I could number men of all shades of opinion among my close personal friends. Such a thought has been to me a comfort in times of doubt and difficulty, and a source, of constant satisfaction, knowing, as I did, that they recognised my anxiety for the true welfare of the community.

In retiring from active work in connection with the "Chronicle," I have the gratification of knowing that I am succeeded by one whose journalistic infancy, so to speak, was spent as a member of the staff, and who has been my close associate, rather than my mere assistant, during the past six, years. I cordially join in your hope that the journal which I directed so long may continue to prosper under his care.

Few pleasures are left to me now, as my impaired eyesight prevents my indulgence of the taste for literature, which I may describe as a ruling passion. True friendships are, therefore, all the more highly prized by me, and it will always be a great comfort, so long as I am permitted to go out and in among you, to meet and converse with those who in my declining years have given me such splendid proof of their esteem, and, I think I may add, their affection.

He had reached the great age of four-score years, and had been editor of the "Coleraine Chronicle" from 1852 until 1897. Under his guidance

that paper took a prominent part in the land reform movement, and materially contributed to the success of the struggles...

... Mr. MacCombie was a native of Ross-shire, N. B., and was a fine specimen of the Highland race --- tall and distinguished in appearance, affable and courteous in manner, and of kindly, generous instincts. ...

... During the next two years the old gentleman was to be seen almost daily strolling about his favourite walks in town and vicinity, or chatting with old friends; but failing strength compelled him to keep indoors since then. On the 20th ult. he had an internal seizure, which prostrated him, and, although carefully tended, be gradually sank, the end coming peacefully en Monday morning. Mrs. MacCombie predeceased him almost ten years ago; hut he is survived by four daughters, all of them married. His death is regretted by a very wide circle of friends.

THE FUNERAL.

The remains of the late Mr. MacCombie was interred in the Coleraine Cemetery on Wednesday, when one of the largest and most repr[e]sentative assemblages ever witnessed at a funeral in the locality gathered at Waterside, and paid a tribute of respect to his memory. ...

... Almost all of the clergy and gentry of the town and district joined with the leading merchants and professional men in the sad procession. Several floral tributes were placed on the coffin, which bore the simple inscription --- "John MacCombie, aged 80 years; died 1st February, 1804." The chief mourners were --- Masters Jas. Letham and John MacC. Crawford (grandsons of the deceased); ...

One of the oldest and most respected residents of Coleraine died on Monday morning last in the person of Mr. John M'Combie, known to two generations of the community by his connection with our local contemporary the Coleraine Chronicle, Mr. M'Combie was a native of Cromarty in Scotland, and inherited a singularly robust constitution, which was retained, apparently unimpaired, until he had passed "the allotted span." His eyesight then began to fail, and he had a serious internal illness in the winter of 1897, from which he never quite recovered. During the past three or four years he had rarely been seen out of doors, and for a week or two previous to his death he had been almost entirely confined to bed.

More than fifty years have passed since Mr. M'Combie first came to Coleraine. His parents had intended him for the ministry, but before his college course was completed his thoughts turned to journalism, and he soon found an opening to his taste in the North of England. Our contemporary was not then in its teens. It had been started by Mr. G. V. Robinson, the local printer, who, owing to pecuniary difficulties, sold the

paper to Mr. Hugh Boyde Mackay, solicitor. After carrying on the concern for a while, Mr. Mackay got tired of it, and in 1851 advertised for a manager. Mr. M'Combie's application was accepted. He came over from England and entered upon his duties as manager and editor of the Chronicle, the imprint in the autumn of 1853 stating that the paper was "printed and published by John M'Combie, for the proprietor, Hugh Boyde Mackay."

At the end of five years Mr. Mackay offered to sell the business to the young editor, but a disagreement as to the terms led to a suit in Chancery. Subsequently, however, matters were amicably arranged, and Mr. M'Combie assumed the ownership of the paper, which, it is interesting to note, was then 4d per copy, afterwards reduced to 3d, and finally --- after its domain bad been raided by the Constitution --- to the ubiquitous penny.

Thus began our old friend's association with the town in which so large part of his life has been spent. The bond of sympathy between an editor and his readers --- that invisible, widely scattered audience which be addresses week by week --- often grows stronger with the passing of the years. A younger generation with new ideas may be pressing forward, but whether the number of readers. diminish or increases, they welcome the arrival of his broadsheet, with its tell-tale touches of the old newspaper hand, and those other typographical lineament which the "constant reader" constantly looks for.

Tributes to Mr. M'Combie from many of his readers were not wanting during the slow years of social and political revolution through which he guided his paper. In those days the Chronicle hit pretty straight from the shoulder. Liberalism and the land agitations were the weekly theme of its editorial columns. It still followed Mr. Gladstone after the disruption of the Liberal party in 1886, though we are happy to add that in this respect our contemporary has since come to see the error of its ways.

During Mr. Mackay's brief tenure of the Chief Secretaryship of Ireland Mr. M'Combie was made a justice of the peace for County Antrim. He then resided at Portrush, but on his health failing about seven years ago he again took up residence in Coleraine. His connection with the Chronicle ceased in 1896. Few men were better known in Coleraine than Mr. M'Combie. His hale, venerable, and prepossessing aspect were known far and wide. We should think he must have made remarkably few enemies, even in the course of his abnormally lengthened professional career, for his affable and generous disposition and invariable buoyancy of spirit were a passport to friendship wherever he went.

Mr. M'Combie had almost attained his 80th year. His wife predeceased him some years ago, and he is survived by four daughters, all of whom are married.

The funeral took place on Wednesday, and was attended by a large number of Mr. M'Combie's old friends. The employes of the Chronicle office carried the remains from the Waterside across the Bridge, after which the coffin was placed in the hearse and

conveyed to the Cemetery, where the burial service was read by the Rev. W. H. Giles, rector of Killowen, and the Rev. Canon Dudley, rector of Coleraine.

Ibex Lodge, the residence of Mr. D. Elkington, the owner of Ripple Vale and Ibex Lodge Hill estates, is so called from the fact that it faces the well-known Ibex Hill, on the rugged heights of which ibex are frequently seen, from the bungalow which stands some 5,700 ft. above sea-level.

The property consists of 350 acres of useful tea land, and about 176 acres and 20 acres respectfully are cultivated for the growing of tea and coffee. The earliest tea plants were put down by the late Mr. William Mullaly in the year 1864, and these are still vigorous, whilst Mr. Elkington, who purchased the estates in 1912, after spending some seventeen years as a tea-planter in Ceylon, is annually adding to the acreage already under this product. The teas are packed in full and half-chests, and are sold on the Colombo market under the name of "Ibex Lodge." The factory in which they are made is a thoroughly modern structure, and it is the first three-storied building to be erected for this purpose on the Nilgiri Hill. It is equipped with a 10-h.p. liquid fuel engine (Rustin, Proctor & Co.), "Economic," "Rapid," and "Little Giant" rolling machines, two Davidson's Siroccos, and sifters. The average annual yield of dry tea is between 400 and 500 lb. to the acre, but this is likely to increase under the policy of clean cultivation and manuring which the proprietor adopts.

The cultivation of coffee in Southern India has depressed considerably in recent years owing to the prevalence of "green bug," but this pest has not been trouble-some on Ibex Hill, and fair crops of exceptionally delicately flavoured high-grown Nilgiri coffee are secured, which are sold to local buyers as "parchment," though a portion is reserved which is sold as "beans" at Rs. 1 per lb., post free to inquirers.

The proprietor is ably assisted by his writer, Mr. A. Venkataswami Moodelliar, and he employs about 150 hands permanently.

Large game is to be found in the districts; tigers, panthers, bears, and also small game, such as woodcock, quail, jungle, and spur fowl and hares.

The rainfall, the figures of which have been kept on the estate since 1888, averages 7.5 in. Ripple Vale is 7 miles distant from Coonor post office, and is 4 miles by road from the Nilgiris railway at Kartary Road station.




